
In the Battery Elimination Test given to select the Valedictorian Stuart and Stanley got the exact same scores and the picking was done by lot.

The following year Mr. Fiore took over this group with the addition of Lorita Hall, Stanley Sterenberg and Carol Torgersen. At that time they were "eager to learn and produced some very nice work".

In 1955 Carl Conway, Joan Konecny, Lynn Korenman, Gene Markham and Jonathan Merdin joined the group to provide Mr. Braisted with a "nice

class" who "labored on projects diligently".

Mrs. Perrella (then Miss Spinelli) kept the class on its toes including with the others Bonnie Sainz and Frank Vigliotti the year. They all enjoyed a very interesting and active time during their six h grade.

Finally, in September of 1956, the group reached the Department where several teachers shared the responsibility of preparing them for High School. Rachel Forster, Norman Hunt and Marcia Swet joined the others to form the 7-1 class with Miss Hirschman as their official teacher In March of 1957, Kathy Devlin and Pamela Letts came up to swell the ranks and in September of that year, Diane Richter became the 36th member of 8-401.

While in the Department, 8-401 had several new experiences. They wrote, produced and presented original playlets; they visited many places of interest; they had end-of-the year outdoor picnics including all members of each family; they started class newspapers; they taperecorded plays acted by members of the class; they started the first P.S. 30 Yearbook; they collected material and set up the last issue of the P.T.A. News.

Now, in June 1958, they are completing their Elementary Grade School history and setting forth to begin a new one for their High School years. May success crown their efforts and lead them to a worthwhile life.
